

DIPLOMA OPTIONS / SEALS



- Students must earn a minimum of 22 credits to graduate in various subject areas, as well as pass Regents exams/department approved assessments in each subject area (English, math, social studies, and science, plus one pathway assessment in one of the following areas: STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), Humanities, CTE, The Arts, or Languages Other Than English (LOTE).
- Types of Diplomas include:
 - Local
 - Regents
 - Advanced Regents
- Types of Seals Offered:
 - Honors (Cumulative average of 90 or higher on the Regents exams required for the Regents/Advanced Regents diploma).
 - Mastery in Math (85 and above on three Math Regents Exams)
 - Mastery in Science (85 and above on three Math Regents Exams)
 - Career and Technical Education (CTE)

- Start planning now!
- Student's should work hard to get the best grades possible!
- Register for classes that align to NCAA's list of approved core courses. The NCAA Eligibility Center will only use approved core courses to certify initial eligibility.
- Student's can access and print NCAA List of Approved Core Courses at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> under the "Resource" tab. Enter school code 334-913

SCHEDULING POINTS

- Review the Curriculum Guide.
- Select elective courses that might be of interest.
- Consult with your teachers and school counselor.
- Student course selections completed by February.
- Course requests will be finalized by March.
- Final schedules will be distributed in August.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSEWORK

- Advanced Placement courses offer opportunities for students to take college-level courses at the high school. Depending on how a student fares, a student can earn college credits towards post-secondary education and/or advance in college courses.
- Student placements in AP courses require teacher recommendations.
- Students registered in Advanced Placement (AP) courses must take the culminating College Board AP examination in May of the school year.
- Students are expected to absorb the cost of the AP exam (\$95 per exam). Interested students who are eligible for fee waivers should see their counselor.
- AP Exams have a score-range of 1-5.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

- Students apply for induction during the fall semester of each academic year beginning in 10th grade.
- Students will be notified where to pick up an application to be considered.
- Requirements Include:
 - Grade Point Average (GPA)
 - Teacher Recommendation
 - Leadership Activities
 - Community Service
 - Work Experience
 - Clubs or sports

COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Community Service is voluntary work (unpaid) performed in one or more areas.
- Students are required to submit 50 hours of community service prior to commencement. Service hours can be completed throughout high school.
- Community Service Forms are available in guidance.
- Students are responsible to keep track of hours and maintain a copy for their own records, prior to submitting forms to their counselor.
