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LET'S TALK ABOUT THE POST-SECONDARY PROCESS!



COLLEGE/TECHNICAL SCHOOL VISITS

- To date, we have 70+ post-secondary schools visiting with Roosevelt High School students.
- Students sign up to meet with representatives individually through Naviance and/or request in-person with guidance as well as submit an approval form.
- Onsite college visits have been scheduled throughout the fall/winter. This is an opportunity for students to be evaluated for admission at specific schools, and receive a decision on the spot.

NAVIANCE

- Every student has an individual log-in credential starting in ninth grade.
- Communication Platform.
- Web-based program that supports students and parents in the career and college planning process.
- Shared resources linking home to school.
- Online tool for collaboration among counselors, students, and parents.

FIVE COMPONENTS OF THE COLLEGE PROCESS:

- High School Transcript
- Standardized Test Scores (SAT/ACT)
- Activity Resume
- Essay/Personal Statement
- Letters of Recommendation



.....and let's not forget about Demonstrated Interest!

THE HIGH SCHOOL TRANSCRIPT

- Rigor in course selections.
- Academic growth.
- Consistency in grades and/or upward progression.
- Cumulative GPA.
- Weighted Grade Point Average (GPA).
- Senior-year course selections.

^{*}Students who are dual-enrolled (taking high school courses and receiving college credits from SUNY Old Westbury - Scholars Academy- MUST request their transcript directly from SUNY Old Westbury to be sent to the college they will be attending.

STANDARDIZED TEST SUBMITTAL

- SAT Score Reports
 - www.collegeboard.org
 - 154 multiple choice questions in 3 hours.
 - Two Sections: Evidenced-Based Reading and Writing; Math.
- ACT Score Reports
 - www.actstudent.org
 - 215 multiple choice questions in 3 hours (not including writing).
 - Four Sections: English; Reading; Math; Science Reasoning.
 - Optional Writing.
- AP (Advanced Placement) Scores
 - https://apstudents.collegeboard.org/

ACTIVITY RESUME

- Extracurricular Activities within and outside of school.
- Community Service
- Athletics/Musical Talents, etc.
- Awards and Recognitions
- Work/Summer Experiences
- Educational Programs
- Leadership

THE ESSAY

- Helps to humanize the process.
- Bring to life student voice and creativity.
- Personal (up to 650words).
- Include affect, expression, and authenticity.
- Will undergo several drafts before being finalized.
- Must be proofread!
- Some college supplemental essays may be required.
- Have a plan in place to devote time in advance.

COMMON & PPLICATION ESS&Y PROMPTS

- 1. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 4. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- 7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.





THE COMMON BLACK COLLEGE APPLICATION

- https://commonblackcollegeapp.com
- Online application.
- 65 Member Institutions, private and public.
- 1 application, 1 fee (\$20).
- No fee waivers available.
- All 65 Member Institutions will have access to your application.
- Select top four institutions you are interested in.
- Essay and Letters of Recommendations are required.

CO&LITION & PPLICATION

- The application is completed online and can be accessed by logging onto www.coalitionforcollegeaccess.org. Some schools will accept the Coalition application in addition to other applications, such as the Common Application, while other schools are exclusive and therefore, require students to use the Coalition application.
- The platform provides a single, centralized toolkit for students to organize, build, and refine their applications to numerous institutions. Coalition schools graduate at least 70 percent of their students within six years, with many having much higher graduation rates. There are currently over 135 Coalition member colleges across the country.

FEE WAIVERS

- Complete a free and reduced lunch form to be eligible for fee waivers:
 - SAT and ACT exams.
 - College Applications (except the Common Black College Application).
 - HEOP/EOP/CD/SEEK opportunities.
 - QuestBridge.
 - Select programs at colleges and universities.

COLLEGE & PPLIC & TION OPTIONS

- Regular Decision: "I am interested and if accepted, I might want to attend."
- **Early Action**: "I am very interested and if accepted, I will most likely attend." (EA I and EA II)
- Early Decision: "It's true love, and if accepted, I must attend, because it is contractually binding." (ED I & II)
- Single Choice/Restrictive Early Action: "I'm very interested, and you're the one and only school I may apply to early." (Non-binding)
- Rolling Admission: "I must apply as soon as possible because applications are reviewed, and decisions are made on a rolling basis."

COLLEGE ADMISSION CRITERIA

4-year colleges

- Transcript
- Standardized test scores (or test optional www.fairtest.org)
- Extracurricular activities
- Recommendations
- Essay
- Demonstrated interest
- Interview (if offered or required)

2-year colleges

- Transcript
- Standardized tests (used for placement)

TEST-OPTION&L/TEST-BLIND/ TEST FLEXIBLE

- 1,700 colleges and universities do not require ACT/SAT scores from the Class of 2022 applicants.
- Test Optional schools allow students to decide whether they want to submit test scores with their application.
- Test Blind schools are those that do not factor test scores into admission decisions even if a student decides to submit their scores.
- Test Flexible schools allow students to choose which type of test(s) they would like to submit with their application.

- Financial Aid Night Wednesday, November 3rd, 2021, 6:00pm
- Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
 - Federal student financial aid, such as Pell grant, student loans, and college work-study. Most schools use FAFSA information to award their own financial aid.
 - You will need to create your FSA ID in order to file FAFSA. https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch
 - Available beginning October 1st.

- CSS/ Financial Aid Profile
 - Approximately 400 colleges & universities use the profile to distribute nonfederal student aid funds.
 - Available beginning October 1^{st.}

- Provides undocumented students access to NYS grants and scholarships to support their higher education costs.

 - Determine your Eligibility.
 - Complete the online application.
 - Monitor the status of your application.
 - Award notification will be sent via email.

LET'S REVIEW POST SECONDARY PLANNING


- All students have options!
- It's not where you go, but what you do when you get there.
- Everyone's path will be unique; try not to compare.
- Organizing post secondary planning into steps can reduce stress.
- Parent role in the process = to advise and support.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES



- Own the Process!
 - Verify the accuracy of your transcript.
 - Take a rigorous academic program.
 - Take the necessary steps to research schools and complete applications ontime!
 - Work on your college essay.
 - Be sure to file with the NCAA if you are a student-athlete.
- Communicate and Monitor!
 - Request official SAT/ACT/AP scores to be sent to colleges and the NCAA.
 - Know which schools you are applying to that require supplemental essays.
 - Verify your transcript and know what teachers you want to write your letters of recommendation.
- Follow-up with your counselor(s) office as deadlines approach!
